HOW OUR DONORS MAKE A DIFFERENCE

With the support of our donors, we served 2,452 people last year through our programs and services.

Our team of trained parent educators and early childhood professionals:

CONDUCTED

277 home visits with local families to provide parenting support and education.

We worked one-on-one with children to engage them in child development activities, conducted developmental assessments, and taught their parents how to support their healthy growth and development.

HELD

over 180 group meetings and training classes for parents and early childhood professionals.

DISTRIBUTED

nearly 70,000 diapers to children in our community.

SERVED

over 1,000 children through early childhood literacy programs.

PROVIDED

high-quality, early childhood education to 95 children enrolled in the NC Pre-K program and nine children who participated in the Dual School program for English language learners.

SUPPORTED

increased the wages of lead teachers in local licensed child care programs.




INCOME SOURCES

OUR WHY

The early childhood phase from infancy to five years of age is the single most vulnerable, teachable, and definable point in a person's life. Infant's brains form rapidly during these first few years of life. In fact, there are twice as many brain synapses occurring in two-to-three-year old's brain than that of an adult.

The more a child is exposed to stimuli, like language and positive interactions with caregivers, the stronger those synapses become. A child's interactions and surroundings during this time have a dramatic effect on the pace and strength of these advances.

A baby's brain makes 1 MILLION neural connections EACH SECOND from birth to age 3!

Brain development is influenced by a child's relationships, experiences, and environments.

90% of brain development occurs before age 5.

Our hope is that every child can live in nurturing environments where they are safe and happy, and where their healthy growth and development are supported.

OUR NEW INITIATIVES

LAUNCHED PARENTS AS TEACHERS IN 2022

In our Parents as Teachers program, we serve a wide range of families from teen parents to grandparents raising their grandchildren. Parents as Teachers (PAT) is an evidence-based home visiting program for parents of children birth to age three. Trained parent educators who visit families in their homes at least twice a month to discuss their child's development and to teach and model parenting skills and techniques. Families also benefit from monthly group gatherings with other parents of like-aged children and connections to

community resources. Parent educators conduct annual development assessments on each child in the program and, when needed, makes referrals to help families access

Support Group for Fathers
